FOREWORD FROM HOST

There were incredible milestones achieved at the 2023 Asia Pacific Summit and Mayors' Forum, which was hosted in Brisbane for the 14th time.

The Brisbane-born conference had the highest attendance of mayors on record, with 118 mayors joining the almost 1,200 strong group of city delegates and business representatives.

The delegates represented 171 cities and 140 young professionals were involved in the forum, a testament to the passion of our future leaders.

Brisbane was honoured to be the second city in the world to achieve gold level under the United Nations' (UN) Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) Cities Global Initiative.

This year's program had several outstanding speakers discuss this year's theme - *Shaping Cities for our Future* through a number of sub themes: Cities of Connection, Cities of Sustainability and Cities of Legacy.

Through interactive workshops, panel discussions and networking evenings, attendees were able to share insights into the complex issues that are facing communities across the Asia Pacific and brainstorm ways our cities can get even better.

From implementing technologies to accelerating sustainability efforts and fostering inclusivity in our communities, the forum drew many important conclusions for our attending mayors, deputy mayors and equivalent representatives to consider.

These discussions led to the development of a common Accord that will shape our approach to local governance in the region until the conference reconvenes in 2025.

Thank you to each of the delegates who attended this year's event, and I look forward to seeing how the ideas discussed are put into practise for years to come.

INTRODUCTION FROM FACILITATORS - MILKEN INSTITUTE

The 2023 Mayors' Forum attracted an all time record number of mayors, deputy mayors and equivalent city leaders representing the diverse geographies, cultures and economies across the Asia Pacific and beyond. These city leaders participated in critical discussions on cities, reaffirming the importance of continuing conversations, seeking out cooperation and tackling the challenges of today and tomorrow in their focus on Cities of the Future.

Despite their vastly different backgrounds, the participating mayors had many commonalities, sharing challenges and opportunities, and in turn, had much to glean and learn from one another's experiences.

The "Cities of Connection" sub-theme saw mayors highlighting the need to close digital divides through investments in infrastructure and education, cultivate trust to boost technological adoption and align incentives to encourage community engagement.

Discussions on the sub-theme "Cities of Sustainability" focused on resource use, food and water security, and economic resilience. Mayors named multiple technologies and innovations they were experimenting with. Key to the adoption of these technologies, and the continued prioritisation of science and innovation, was steadfast leadership across the ups and downs of the economy.

On the sub-theme "Cities of Legacy", mayors underscored the importance of equality and respect, trust and transparency, partnerships, and sustainability. Liveable cities could be cultivated by focusing on the people and community, and placing primacy on good governance.

On behalf of the Milken Institute, we are honoured to have facilitated conversations among participating mayors at the 2023APCS Mayors' Forum, and are proud to introduce the 2023APCS Mayors' Accord. The Accord and its ten principles have been adopted by all signatories and encapsulate the individual and collective aspirations of the mayors as they shape their cities for today and tomorrow.

We thank the Lord Mayor of Brisbane Adrian Schrinner and Brisbane City Council for being such tremendous hosts, and all participating mayors, deputy mayors and equivalent city leaders for their commitment and dedication.

2023APCS HOST CITY

BRISBANE SNAPSHOT

Brisbane is a thriving multicultural city, steadily building on its reputation as a global city.



Today, Brisbane is a safe, vibrant, green and prosperous city, valued for its friendly and optimistic people and enjoyable lifestyle. Brisbane benefits from rich biodiversity and is home to more than 800 species of wildlife, 2,500 species of native plants and many thriving areas of bushland, parks and waterways. Often referred to as the River City, Brisbane is built around the winding Brisbane River and is characterised by a warm subtropical climate, outdoor lifestyle, hilly suburban pockets and Queenslander style housing.

Brisbane is home to vibrant retail and dining precincts from the city to the suburbs, with extensive parkland spaces for sport and leisure, festivals, arts and entertainment. Brisbane has a multicultural and linguistically diverse population, with approximately one third of residents born overseas and 24% speaking a language other than English at home. Its world ranking universities also drew 100,922 international student enrolments in 2020. Brisbane is a global hub in scientific innovation, mining and resources, technology, higher education and cultural attractions. Greater Brisbane has an economy of \$181 billion, accounting for 49% of Queensland's and 9% of Australia's economic output.

PREFACE

The Asia Pacific Cities Summit (APCS) & Mayors' Forum has been welcoming city leaders, future makers and trailblazers for more than 25 years, creating a forum to share and propel government and business relations and showcase the capabilities of cities to the world.

The APCS has become the hallmark event for those at the forefront of cities, drawing one of the largest and most diverse gatherings of mayors in the world. As an award-winning summit (Australian Event Awards Conference of the Year 2020), the alumni of participating cities now surpasses 550.

Under the overarching theme of 'Shaping Cities for our Future', the 14th Asia Pacific Cities Summit & Mayors' Forum (2023APCS) was held in Brisbane from 11-13 October 2023.

The 2023APCS was the first Summit held at full physical capacity since the global coronavirus pandemic, and welcomed almost 1,200 delegates from a record-breaking 171 cities, including 118 Mayors and equivalents.

The 2023APCS provided an exclusive opportunity for participating leaders to re-engage with the world at a significant scale as we shape our cities for the future.

The 2023APCS Mayors' Forum, the cornerstone of the 2023APCS, was held on 11 October. The Forum was co-facilitated by Curtis S. Chin, Chair, Asia Fellows, Milken Institute and Amos Garcia, Director, Asia, MI International, Milken Institute.

This Mayors' Accord is a tangible outcome of the 2023APCS Mayors' Forum and and allows Mayors to agree on a set of guiding principles to implement in their jurisdictions.




